Sue, the PA continued, 'Hon Minister Ken Wyatt has heard about the work that IofCA is doing and wants to come to listen.' It was a very composed, yet inwardly outrageously excited, response from me, 'Sue, that will be wonderful.'

Within a week of the Hon Minister's set date, we were already busy preparing for Thomas Mayor's return to Armagh. As you are well aware, Thomas is a signatory to the *Uluru Statement from the Heart*, and a strong voice for the future of a more harmonious Australia. Thomas helped us launch our Trustbuilding Project in truth telling and truth hearing last year. We were preparing two key events with him as our guest speaker, the first an invitation to 30 Community leaders for an intimate forum, the second a larger and more open group in the evening.

You can imagine the movement at Armagh, preparing for these two visits - 'flurry' seems to be an appropriate word, yet tailored with well discussed and considered approaches. What was it that we wanted the Hon Minister to hear from us? How could we support both Thomas Mayor and Hon Ken Wyatt in their respective journeys for change?

The lofCA Aboriginal Art Auction 'Painted Stories' held on the evening of Thursday 24 March featured 21 artworks by women of the central Australian desert. The vibrant hues and kinetic textures of the artworks popped with illumination under the spot lights.



Ethically sourced by long term IofCA friend and volunteer Margo Birnberg, the paintings express the beauty of



women's business: ways of knowing, healing and loving Country. Margo graced the stage speaking of her lifelong love of First Peoples' culture and calling us to treasure it with all our hearts. Margo Inspired the audience to embrace First Nation culture and the women's stories communicated through the art work.

The art auction vision and aim to raise funds for the Trustbuilding program came to life with meticulous execution and skilled event implementation, made

possible through seamless collaboration and volunteer management.

lofCA Executive Officer, Marg Hepworth spoke succinctly and with deep purpose about the work of Initiatives of Change, enticing new friends and Toorak neighbours to follow the emerging First People's Pathway.

Aunty Joy Wandin Murphy was charmed by IofCA's compelling history and warm hospitality. With deep presence she spoke before joyfully watching her great nieces dance the *Djirri Djirri*, willy wag tail dance.

Guests enjoyed the Torres Strait Islander food including crocodile crumbed with coconut, a sensational talking point. Same for The Lilly Pilly Mocktail made from Koori super berries which has promoted collagen production in First Womens' hair and skin for thousands of years.



With an all-female line up, the auctioneer Jenny Gibson humoured the audience whilst skilfully selling all artworks.

The Art Auction's success has put Armagh on the map as an event space. Future collaborations bubbled and new friendships formed inspiring first steps for changemaking with First Peoples leadership.

Myall Creek Massacre Memorial Pilgrimage



The Myall Creek Massacre Memorial is held in mid-June every year. Last year a group led by the IofCA Sydney team gathered to journey to the memorial. Their experience was life altering. This year we are inviting many more of you to join this journey, a pilgrimage of honour and reconciliation.

Graeme Cordiner, who sits on the *Friends of Myall Creek* Committee, writes:

Myall Creek is a place of national pilgrimage. Out of hundreds of massacres during the Frontier Wars, it was the only time some justice was done when some of those directly involved were hung.

Every Australian needs to engage this history. We are often hesitant to do so for it is such a dark story. However, Myall Creek today demonstrates that this journey leads us all into a much larger space, a place of love made possible through the Aboriginal gift of forgiveness, and for the recipients in accepting that gift and in so doing accepting the truth of our history, and our shared responsibility down to today.

A free gift, yet not without cost - 60,000 years of Dreaming, 230 years of nightmares for Aboriginal people.

So in this astonishingly healing context we can gain the courage to walk this path. In doing it together with others there is a much heightened sense of a shared journey.

lofCA CoP facilitator *Prashanti Hagare* writes:

Going to Myall Creek is the highlight of my 29 years of life in Australia. It was a very spiritual experience for me. I felt the healing, the love and welcome by our indigenous people. I do feel now I have the permission to seek and learn more about Aboriginal culture. The way the dancers invited us to dance with them, and the way Auntie Sue and Clayton Blacklock welcomed us on both days felt like a warm embrace ... I commit to spread the message to every Australian I know so they get inspired to go on this journey to learn and heal and move forward together.


