



Milestones reached this year:

• Great success on Amiel's inspired initiative to attend Pacific Australia Youth Association – Young Pacific Leaders Summit in Tonga 20-25 November 2023.

Ongoing projects:

- Peacebuilding initiative: the development of Peacebuilding initiative for our communities, along with a
 Community Building event for the Karen community in Brisbane. The team, especially Amiel
 continuously work towards justice, healing and reconciliation in Rwanda and around the anniversary of
 Genocide in Rwanda in April each year organizes an event in the Queensland Parliament in memory of
 those lost, and to commit to peace.
- Life Matters Taster Sessions: At the first session 30 people came consisting of a mixture of young people from the Logan area. It is fantastic to see the passion of Mu, Naome and Amiel who all spoke about their purpose for taking on Life Matters. There's an impressive group of young community leaders in Brisbane and Logan a team waiting and ready to be built. Life Matters workshop will be held for the first time in QLD next year from 31 May to 2 June
- Trustbuilding: Friends were met through the IofCA trustbuilding work, the Turruk workshops, the YES campaign, will continue with the invitation of the Uluru Statement of the Heart, especially with truth-telling. Many of these conversations and initiatives are not directly Initiatives of Change but inspired by IofC.

Gratitude for an amazing team and all the known and unknown support we have had this year from new and old friends, for the building up of a team for which we say "onwards and upwards". We are aiming high and trust in an inspiring outcome. We're grateful for and enjoy the sharing of our own journeys of change, forgiveness, finding resilience and healing and have much to learn from one another.

Our Programs



2023 started with hosting a Canadain First Nations Delegation as a prequel to the Global Indigenous Dialogue in IofC Caux Switzerland. The delegation included Lewis Cardinal, a Woodland Cree communicator from northern Alberta along with Chief Lee Crowchild, a respected Tsuut'ina environmentalist and ceremonialist. They sought to join and learn from the national conversation with Australian First Nations people, at a time when the shape and content of Voice and Treaty were being debated.

Starting from Melbourne the delegation travelled to Wagga Wagga, Sydney, Arnhem Land and Cherbourg for a range of events.

Exceeding expectations, First Nations Wisdom for Regenerative Futures made its mark as a memorable Melbourne event at the iconic Capitol Theatre on Sunday 19 February. The event was organised in partnership with the Sustainable Architecture Forum at the Australian Institute of Architects and indigenous elders from Australia and Canada. Together we explored deep listening practices that nurture First Peoples' relationship to place and the role of urban learning landscapes that are sacred, inclusive, and regenerative.







Resonating vibrations of the yidaki filled the theatre, First Nation Australians: Ash Dargan, Dylan Charles , Uncle Shane Charles, grounded us to a sacred space for deep listening.





The fourth round of Turruk workshops, joining First Peoples led yarning circles with an army of allies, commenced on Tuesday 9 May with inperson and online participation.

FIRST NATIONS EMERGENCE YOUTH SUMMIT

The Emergence Summit took place on Sunday 10 September with over 80 people both in person at Armagh and online. First Nations Emerging Leaders Kirstine Wallis, Nartarsha Bamblett and Leigh Saunders spoke on topics that are their spirits work.













What do an investigative Afghan journalist, a Japanologist and author on Ikigai, a champion ice speed skater and a chiropractor who loves singing? They are all among the 14 participants in the latest Life Matters Workshop which took place over the Cup Day weekend 3-6 November in Melbourne.

A vital part of the Life Matters experience is the supportive community of volunteers – many of them former participants – who come together to make it happen. The tone was set by one of these volunteers on the opening night who spoke about how he had found positive life direction through the course at a time when he was feeling rather lost and without firm foundations in his life. The course had given him the will to mend some important relationships including the one with his Mum.

Life Matters weaves together times for participants to look inwards, reflecting on their gifts, strengths, values and relationships. Alongside this there are are more outward focused times being inspired by the experiences of people like Prof. Paul Komesaroff, a medical doctor, philosopher and peace activist who has visited Gaza many times and promotes dialogue and reconciliation across cultural, racial and religious divides; and Peter Baynard-Smith who had felt called to a life of service with various not-for-profit organisations in developing countries after graduating as an engineer.

Each morning participants were introduced to the practice of inner listening to discern the deep inner wisdom that comes from beyond the thinking mind. This was one of the key learnings for several of the participants who described it as life changing. One told of how a few weeks later he was offered a job in another company with a much bigger budget, but in his time of inner listening he saw that it would be a mistake because they were not aligned with his values, so he declined the job.

Another recent immigrant to Australia wrote about how inspiring it was to hear the stories and struggles of other people: "Dwelling on personal traumatic experiences, especially workplace mistreatment, left me feeling hurt and powerless. I believed I wasn't good enough or I didn't have enough to give as I struggled in the competitive IT industry. Now, I realize that if we clearly know what is right, and firmly believe that we are living by the right values, then we will not so easily be hurt again. Strength emerges the moment when we recognize our adequacy. I decided to choose to shift my focus from dwelling in my own sadness to finding meaning in engaging with interesting, fresh and dynamic people from diverse cultures and backgrounds.

CREATORS OF PEACE CIRCLE

Creators of Peace Circles take place as a series of meetings led by two trained facilitators, who invite participants to explore several different themes around the broader concept of peace. Within the circle, each person puts her mind to the task of dissecting 'what peace means to me.' Participants practice deep and analytical thinking in a supportive group setting where everyone practices active listening while sharing their unique yet unifying stories.

Each session had a different theme which was explored through readings, discussion. music and meditation and sometimes some workshop-type exercises.

At the end of each session there was a time of deep inner journeying to connect with the voice of wisdom that is beyond normal human consciousness.

There was repairing, restoring, polishing furniture and silverware, cleaning walls and floors, and outdoors in the gardens raking and bagging dead leaves, cutting back overgrowth and weeding garden beds.











NATIONAL GATHERING - RETREAT

The National Gathering-Retreat, held at Armagh from 17th to 19th November, brought together 40 people in person and an additional 15 online for a time of fellowship and in-depth discussions on the challenges facing IofC Australia.

During two sessions focused on post-Referendum Australia, we reaffirmed our commitment to supporting First Nations people in their ongoing pursuit of the Uluru Statement and state-level processes. Simultaneously, we agreed to enhance the experience and outreach of the Turruk trust-building program and explore story-sharing and truth-telling dialogues aimed at engaging 'mainstream' and multicultural Australians through a 'Listening for a change forums' format.

Other discussions centered around revitalizing the grassroots movement of IofCA changemakers, recognizing that effective communication with the network and harnessing their concerns and energies will require a range of approaches. The Board and the coordination team are currently evaluating the options and suggestions that have surfaced.

Additionally, the Board provided an update on the progress toward a new Constitution, which is nearing its final stage and will be presented to our members in the New Year.

As always, the National Gathering-Retreat meeting provided an opportunity for personal connections among our members, and the 'Family times' shared were greatly appreciated. We left the gathering feeling challenged and rejuvenated, filled with new hope and energy.




World Forum hears about Trustbuilding


